Usage notes and hints assist with grammar and usage. It also includes the section, "A Guide for Writers," that introduces and explains punctuation marks, formation of plurals, and use of capitalization and italics.

	Know and use correct capitalization, punctuation, and abbreviations.	<i>Merriam-Webster's Elementary Dictionary</i> includes "A Guide for Writers" section that introduces and explains punctuation marks, formation of plurals, and use of capitalization. Abbreviations are easy to find in the main vocabulary section.
	Spell frequently used words correctly using phonics rules and exceptions.	<i>Merriam-Webster's Elementary Dictionary</i> provides correct spellings for more than 36,000 commonly used words, including variant spellings.
5	Use organizational features of printed text (for example, page numbering, alphabetizing, glossaries, chapter heading, tables of contents, indexes, captions).	The "Using Your Dictionary" section in the front of <i>Merriam-Webster's Elementary Dictionary</i> shows students how to access the dictionary's features. The section includes a two-page color-coded "Key to Using Your Dictionary."
	Use organizational features to locate media or electronic information (for example, passwords, entry menu features, pull-down menus, icons, key word searches).	Students can look up words online on Merriam-Webster's free student Web site, <i>Merriam-Webster's Word Central</i> (WordCentral.com), which offers a student dictionary as well as a thesaurus and word games.

Strategies can include looking up unfamiliar words in <i>Merriam-Webster's Elementary Dictionary</i> , for students through grade 5, or <i>Merriam-Webster's Intermediate Dictionary</i> , which is especially written for students in grades 6–8, and contains nearly 70,000 entries. Both dictionaries feature up-to date vocabulary.
2	Choose vocabulary and figures of speech that communicate messages clearly and precisely.	<i>Merriam-Webster's Intermediate Thesaurus</i> offers grade-level-appropriate synonyms, antonyms, related and contrasted words, and idioms. It provides an example sentence to illustrate each word in its synonym lists. Used in conjunction with <i>Merriam-Webster's Intermediate Dictionary</i> , it can help students choose the words they need to communicate clearly.
	Draft, revise, edit, and proofread for a legible final copy.	<i>Merriam-Webster's Intermediate Dictionary</i> includes "A Handbook of Style" section that explains the use of punctuation marks and capitalization. Students might also refer to <i>Merriam-Webster's Notebook Guide to Punctuation</i> , <i>Merriam-Webster's Pocket Guide to Punctuation</i> , and <i>Merriam-Webster's Pocket Guide to English Usage</i> .
